WHO IS MENTAL HEALTH AMERICA OF GREATER HOUSTON?

During the interim and in partnership with countless community stakeholders, The Center solidified support around policies of longstanding interest to the legislature and, more specifically, policies important for creating safe and supportive school environments for Texas' students.

Mental Health Research Collaborative: Effective, Efficient & Accountable School-Based Mental Health Programs

HB 906 (Joint Authors: Thompson, Senfronia | Phelan | Moody | Bonnen, Greg | Coleman / Coauthors: Bernal | Blanco | Ortega | Zwiener Sponsor: Powell / Cosponsor: Hall) **SB 992** (Author: Powell)

This bill establishes a university-based, collaborative task force to study and evaluate certain state-funded, public school mental health programs and practices. This task force would serve to ensure these state monies are spent effectively and efficiently. The Texas Legislature is proposing to spend millions of dollars on school mental health programs. This bill will provide accountability for Texas' taxpayers.

House Vote: 113 Yeas, 30 Nays Senate Vote: 29 Yeas, 2Nays Signed by Governor Abbott 6/14/2019 & Effective Immediately

Back to School: Transition Support for Justice-Involved Youth Returning to School

HB 2184 (Joint Authors: Allen | White | Wu | Phelan | Morales) | SB 1155 (Author: Huffman)

This bill creates a pathway back to school for justice-involved youth by empowering school districts enrollment assistance to students through the creation of individualized transition plans. To the extent possible, an individualized transition plan must be developed within five instructional days following a youth's release from a disciplinary alternative education program, a juvenile justice alternative education program, a residential program or facility operated by-or-under contract with the Texas Juvenile Justice Department, a juvenile board, or any other governmental entity.

House Vote: 123 Yeas, 21 Nays

Senate Vote: 31 Yeas, 0 Nays

Signed by Governor Abbott 6/10/2019 & Effective Immediately

Educator Training on Emotional Trauma, Grief, and Behavioral Health

HB 1623 (Author:Coleman)

This bill streamlines language within existing state code to ensure school districts have clear direction regarding training educators on how to recognize and respond to possible physical and emotional trauma suffered by students. In addition, this legislation encourages reporting of a school district's training numbers to the Texas Education Agency by allowing for the prioritization of reporting school districts and public charter schools to receive competitive grant programs for mental health services.

Passed as an amendment to SB 11
